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DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT

New York State approved this law, effective July 1, 2012

*Was approved and implemented within one year of drafted legislation...

- Dignity for All Students Act: Signed into law by Governor Patterson
- The Board of Education approved Policy # 0115, on March 8, 2011, as part of the implementation of this Act.

D.A.S.A. Overview:

- All public elementary and secondary school students are protected.
- DASA prohibits the harassment and discrimination of students by students and by school personnel.
- DASA prohibits retaliation against anyone who reports incidents of bullying.
- Each school's Code of Conduct must be amended to reflect the prohibition of discrimination and harassment of students by students or staff in age-appropriate language.

D.A.S.A. Overview: Continued...

- Districts must appoint at least one staff member
 (DIGNITY ACT COORDINATOR) in each school to handle all
 bullying incidents on school property (including athletic fields,
 playgrounds, and parking lots), in school buildings, on a school
 bus/vehicle, as well as at school-sponsored events or activities).
- All Staff must report incidents of harassment and/or bullying (Behavior and Harassment Form) http://www.nea.org/home/43496.htm

- Analogous to <u>Mandated</u> Child Protection Reporting
- Administrators must report incidents of bullying or bias-based harassment to the NYS Department of Education

How does DASA define: Bullying?

- Threats, intimidating behavior or abuse on school property that interferes with a student's safety and learning experience or causes a student to be afraid for his or her safety through the expectation of bodily or emotional harm.
- The Act provides that the bullying conduct or verbal behavior must be severe or pervasive enough to substantially interfere with a student's education to be considered harassment under the Act.
- Specifically, DASA provides protection against bullying conduct based on certain protected classes including, but not limited to, the student's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender, or sex.
- Effective on July 1, 2013, the definition of bullying will include cyber-bullying as well as harassment that occurs off school property that creates a risk for harm or bullying on school property.

D.A.S.A. Bulletin Board:

When teachers and staff witness Harassment and/or Bullying, they MUST take the following steps:

STEP 1: Take some reasonable steps to intervene...

Ex: Separate children, conduct initial assessment of the incident

STEP 2: REPORT IT!

Dignity Act Coordinators interview participants and bystanders, inform parent(s), report findings, determine consequences, implement code of conduct, check in with victim, etc...
